The Master of Ceremony (MC) invited the District Budget Analyst to lead the discussion. Ms. Rabiatu Issah led the discussion of the 2022 Annual Budget Implementation Performance. She informed stakeholders that the analyses cover an accumulation of Revenue and Expenditure performance for Sekyere South District Assembly from January to December of the 2022 financial year. The focus was on the IGF because; the Assembly had total control over the mobilization and disbursement of that Fund.

From the Discussion, the Assembly as at December 2022 had receipted an amount of Nine Million, Four Hundred and Fifty-One Thousand, Six Hundred and Forty-One Ghana Cedi, Eighty-Two Ghana Pesewas (GH¢9,451,641.82) out of a total Annual Budget of Twelve Million, One Hundred and Twenty-Seven Thousand, Nine Hundred and Sixty-Seven Ghana Cedi, Twenty-Three Ghana Pesewas (GH¢12,127,967.23). The overall performance of the Assembly in terms of it IGF was averagely well. Based on the Assemblies Performance in Revenue Mobilization exercise, the IGF Budget for the current year was set at Nine Hundred and Forty-seven Thousand Ghana Cedi only (GH¢947,000.00). Also, Approved Revenue Budget from all sources for the current year set at Ten Million, Nine Hundred and Forty-Six Thousand, Nine Hundred and Fifty-Two Ghana Cedi, Sixty-Nine Ghana Pesewas (GH¢10,946,952.69).

The Expenditure Budget approved for the year 2022 was Twelve Million, One Hundred and Twenty-Seven Thousand, Nine Hundred and Sixty-Seven Ghana Cedi, Twenty-Three Ghana Pesewas (GH¢12,127,967.23).

- Participants asked if one needs to obtain a permit before mounting temporal structure in the Assembly. The District Co-ordinating Director responded that, there is a directive from the Assembly and Traditional Authority Council that no one should mount a temporal structure in the Agona Township but if there is no such directive in one's jurisdiction then there is the need for one to obtain a permit before mounting a temporal structure.
- Participants made inquiry on need to pay Property rate since they are the sole owners of such properties. The DCD responded that, the Property rate is another source of revenue to the government for developmental projects in the assemblies and if not paid will reduce the revenue to the government and subsequently affect its ability to undertake developmental projects since the district will receive less from the government for such projects.
- Participants made inquiry on how the Assembly uses the monies collected from the citizens. The District Co-ordinating Director responded that, these monies are used in running the day to day activities of the assembly as well as undertaking certain projects in the district such as extension of water and construction of urinals in various market in district wide.
